Course Description:

Students in this course will be required to see and discuss at least five Shakespeare plays. Several theater trips will be available, and films and videotapes will be screened in class or in the library. Students will be able to complete an in-depth review of a Shakespeare production by the end of the semester as well as to complete a term paper on some aspect of Shakespeare's works. Students will be required to know the basic facts about Shakespeare's life and theater craft and will be able to identify and discuss the basic elements of comedy, tragedy, history, and romance plays.

Students are encouraged to participate in a Student Life and Activities subsidized trip to a live Shakespeare performance. If a student misses a class, he/she/they must go to the library and view any productions which were shown in the class missed.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Analyze orally and in writing a live or filmed Shakespeare projection to show how that production interprets the text of the play.
- Identify the genres of Comedy, History, Tragedy and Romance as they apply to Shakespeare's work.
- Utilize the various forms of Shakespearean verse to analyze a Shakespeare play.
- Discuss Shakespeare's characterizations.
- Write an in-depth term paper on some aspect of Shakespeare's plays including valid research to back up the ideas.
- Respond successfully on an essay exam. (Core Competencies: Communication, Critical thinking, Information Literacy)

Students who participate in this course and complete all the assignments will have a good foundation for reading Shakespeare's works and will understand the nature of his theater. Students will be able to explain that all productions are an interpretation of the text, and they will be able to read and understand Shakespeare's poetry, both in his plays and in his poems.
