Course Description: In Physical Geography, which is a branch of the natural sciences, students will comprehend and learn about the different aspects of our physical and human environment. Through the study of tectonics, as well as examining fluvial, glacial, coastal, karst and desert landforms, students will gain a comprehensive understanding of earth movements, and other geomorphological processes. Students will also apply a locational component through mapping skills, to gain an overview of the distribution of physical features and evaluate and analyze how these have had an effect on humans.

Course Learning Outcomes:

- 1) Acquire an understanding of how Physical Geography is a branch of the Earth Sciences.
- 2) Examine and apply the knowledge of landform history and dynamics in understanding the spatial characteristics of different natural phenomena on the Earth's surface.
- 3) Analyze the processes that have shaped the earth, both in the present as well as in the past.
- 4) Evaluate the dynamics of landform history and predict future change and how it will have an impact on humans.

Course Content: Introduction to Physical Geography has been structured to give students a comprehensive understanding of a specific area of the natural sciences, concentrating on earth movements and the geomorphological processes which have created different landforms. The course will also have a <u>map component</u>, to facilitate the global and locational understanding of the distribution of physical features on the earth's surface.

- 1) Essentials of Geography
- 2) The Dynamic Planet
- 3) Tectonics, Earthquakes and Volcanism
- 4) Weathering, Karst Landscapes and Mass Movement
- 5) River Systems
- 6) Oceans, Coastal Systems and Wind Processes
- 7) Glacial and Periglacial Landscapes

Optional Topics:

- 1) Atmosphere System
- 2) Water, Weather and Climate Systems
