Course Description: Students will examine the complex historical, sociocultural and environmental forces which have shaped the African-American culture and its communities in the United States. After surveying how slavery became institutionalized in Colonial America, students will focus on events, legislation and issues defining struggles, acts of resistance, varied accomplishments and cultural experiences unique to African-American from the pre-Civil War period and Reconstruction Era to contemporary times.

Prerequisites: READ 095 and ENGL 095 or satisfactory completion of the College's foundational studies requirement in reading and writing.
