Course Code: HIST 217 Title: History of Modern Latin America

Institute: Business and Social Science Department: History

Course Description: Over the past two hundred years, Latin America has experienced profound transformations that still resonate today. Our goal in this class is to examine significant events within specific countries, such as the Mexican Revolution, and to shed light on the broader developments of Latin American history since Independence. The class begins with the tumultuous nineteenth century, starting with Independence. In focusing on state formation and national identity, our aim is to understand the dramatic social, cultural, and political impact of Latin America's post-Independence political conflicts and modernizing growth. We will examine the rise and fall of export economies and industrialization; dependency and underdevelopment; gender, poverty, and social reform; military dictatorships and repression; the search for social justice: and Latin America's problematic relationship with the U.S.

Prerequisites: READ 095 and ENGL 095 or satisfactory completion of the College's foundational studies requirement in reading and writing.
