# **Syllabus**

Course Code: RUSS 101 Title: Elementary Russian I

**Institute:** Humanities **Department:** Languages and ESL

Course Description: This course is designed for students with no previous knowledge, or very limited knowledge, of the Russian language. Strong emphasis will be placed on acquiring conversational and comprehension skills, using practical and interesting situational materials that will stress both language and culture. Grammatical patterns and syntax will be introduced with the aim that students read and write what they have learned to say and understand. (This course is not open to native Russian speakers or to students with more than two years of Russian in high school, except by instructor approval.)

#### Unit 1

## By the end of this unit a student will be able to:

- read and write Russian words aloud and silently for meaning
- name basic words for people, places, clothing, and everyday objects in Russian
- ask and tell where things are located and to whom they belong
- understand numbers from 0-10 and count up to 10
- understand greetings and greet people at different times of day
- understand and use greetings at different levels of formality
- make acquaintances in Russian
- use very common politeness formulas
- recognize the conventions for names in Russian and their connection with levels of formality

# To accomplish these outcomes, a student will learn this information about the language:

- how the letters of the Cyrillic alphabet encode sounds
- how word stress and vowel reduction change the pronunciation of Russian words
- how Russian's system of paired vowels relates to the concept of hard and soft consonants
- how nouns are divided into a system of genders in Russian
- what levels of formality there are and how they are expressed (ты / вы , привет vs. здравствуйте)
- how the dictionary form of a noun relates to its stem
- how to make nouns plural
- how to make possessive adjectives (my, your, our, etc.) agree with nouns

#### Unit 2

## By the end of this unit a student will be able to:

- describe your own family and understand a short description of a family
- ask and tell using the adverbs "here" and "there" where people live
- label pictures of apartment rooms and furniture and give brief descriptions
- understand Russian addresses
- understand basic descriptions (young, old, new, big, small, etc.) and use them in statements and questions about people, places and objects
- understand and tell about a person's ethnicity (nationality) or national origin of an object
- show you know basic facts about the geography and ethnic makeup of the Russian Federation

## To accomplish these outcomes, a student will learn this information about the language:

- family member vocabulary
- words for adjectives and how to make them agree with nouns
- the conjugation of the verb жив-
- numbers from 0-100

- vocabulary for geographical features and parts of an address
- noun and adjectives referring to nationality, and when to use which one

#### Unit 3

## By the end of this unit a student will be able to:

- ask and tell about activities (work, relax, stroll, read, listen, think, write, play) that you and others are doing or do regularly
- ask and tell about what you and others read and listen to, and compare that to Russian reading and listening habits
- ask about and discuss playing games and instruments
- distinguish which Russian "school-related" words and phrases refer to university and which refer to elementary through high school
- ask about and discuss what academic subjects you are studying
- ask about and discuss what languages you know, speak, read, and write, and indicate how well you can do those actions in the language
- ask about and indicate where people and things are located

## To achieve these outcomes, a student will learn this information about the language:

- conjugating verbs in the present tense (1st and 2nd conjugation)
- using verb complements: direct objects, adverbs, prepositional phrases
- noun and adjective endings for direct objects (accusative case)
- locational phrases with prepositions and the prepositional case of nouns and adjectives
- B + accusative case after "play" with games
- на + prepositional case after "play" with musical instruments
- when to use по-русски and when to use русский язык when talking about language abilities

#### **Department Policies:**

- A student must attain at least a C average (70%) on tests in order to receive a C in the class. Homework points will not raise a D grade.
- A student who receives less than a C as a final grade may not continue to the next level.
- Tests are subject to review by the department.
- If a student's aural or oral level is too low and impedes comprehension significantly, the instructor may require the student to take a conversation course before moving on to the next level of ESL.
- Incomplete: An Incomplete (INC) may be assigned at the discretion of the course faculty for students who have extraordinary circumstances of documented hardship or emergency. These are students who have been actively participating throughout the term and have completed a significant portion of the course in a satisfactory manner but approach the end of the term without completing all assignments. The following process should be followed:
  - The student contacts the faculty member with the appropriate documentation.

- The incomplete contract is completed by the faculty member and must be signed by both the faculty member and the student.
- Students will be notified by email to check their grades and to speak to their counselor about the impact of the incomplete.
- All course work should be completed by the twenty-first (21st) day after the end of the current semester or term, exclusive of official College closings.
- When a student completes the work satisfactorily, the faculty member will submit a change of grade.
- If work is not completed satisfactorily, the Registrar will change the INC to an F.
  Students will be notified by e-mail.
- o For the purpose of calculating academic standing, the INC will be treated as an F.
