COURSE DESCRIPTION: Students will develop the public speaking skills central to success in academic, civic, business, and professional life. Students who complete Speech 115 will have performed informative, persuasive, and demonstrative speeches before an audience thereby exhibiting competence in academic research, technological literacy, ethical reasoning, critical thinking, organization, and extemporaneous delivery.

PREREQUISITES: ESL 012 or READ 092 or READ 094 or READ 095 or satisfactory completion of the college's Foundational Studies Requirement in Reading.

 - use of key-word/key-phrase outlining skills/extemporaneous delivery
 - establishing speaker credibility
 - integrating oral source citation in body of speech
 - developing and using a speaking outline
 - understanding effective use of visual aids
 - identifying and using most appropriate organizational pattern
 - applying informative speaking principles
 - speech critiquing skills.
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Unit 3: Persuasive Speaking

Activity: 5-7 minute Speech to Persuade

Readings: OER required readings in Canvas

Objectives: Students will demonstrate proficiency in:

- developing a persuasive proposition of fact, value, or policy
 - researching databases from Brookdale's online library
 - researching, selecting, and using supporting evidence
 - constructing a typed MLA Works Cited page
 - use of key-word/key-phrase outlining skills/extemporaneous delivery
 - use of intro/body/conclusion structure
 - constructing valid arguments
 - using ethical, logical, and emotional appeals
 - establishing speaker credibility
 - using appropriate organizational pattern for persuasive speech
 - using refutation skills
 - speech critiquing skills
 - selecting and using appropriate language.
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Unit 4: Demonstrative Speaking

Activity: 4-7 minute Speech to Demonstrate

Readings: Online resources available on Canvas

Objectives: Student will demonstrate:

- developing a clear specific purpose
- use of introduction – body – conclusion structure
- use of key-word/key-phrase outlining skills/extemporaneous delivery
- fundamental outlining skills
- use of appropriate visual aid(s) to teach a procedure
- ability to give clear instructions
- speech critiquing skills.

Grading: Students are required to complete the preparation work, perform, and pass the major speech requirements in units 2-3 & 4 in order to pass the course.
