# Introduction

Trent University is happy to announce that new software has been introduced that allows the university to produce the academic calendar in a more modern and accessible format. This new format allows for an intuitive and mobile-friendly experience for students, faculty, and staff.

A project team was established in 2023, and a full analysis and review of requirements was completed and followed by a request for proposal (RFP) process. In 2024 a contract was awarded to the successful vendor, Coursedog.

The implementation of this modern tool has allowed us to streamline information and provide improved search capabilities which allows for quick access to course, program, and policy information.

We hope that the increased functionality and new features within the calendar make for an improved user experience for all.

The new Calendar allows for seamless navigation between Undergraduate and Graduate programs, courses, and applicable academic regulations.

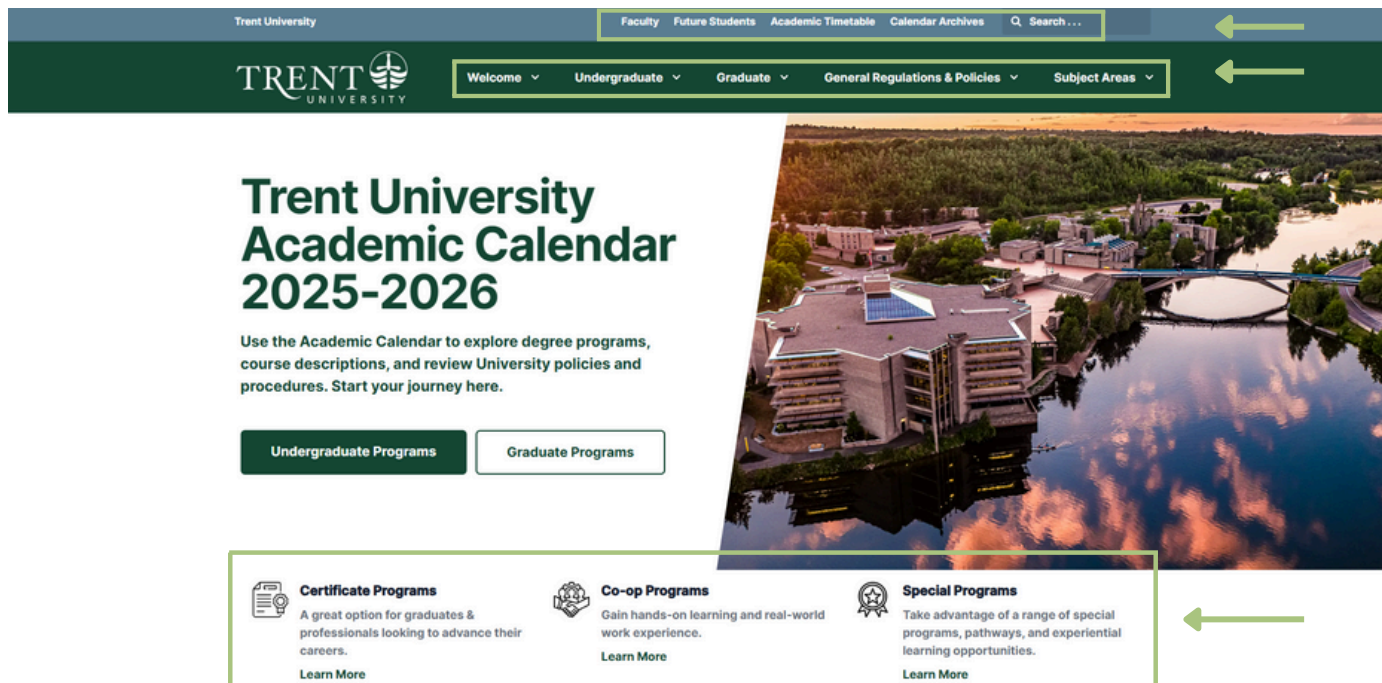


Figure 1: University Calendar Homepage

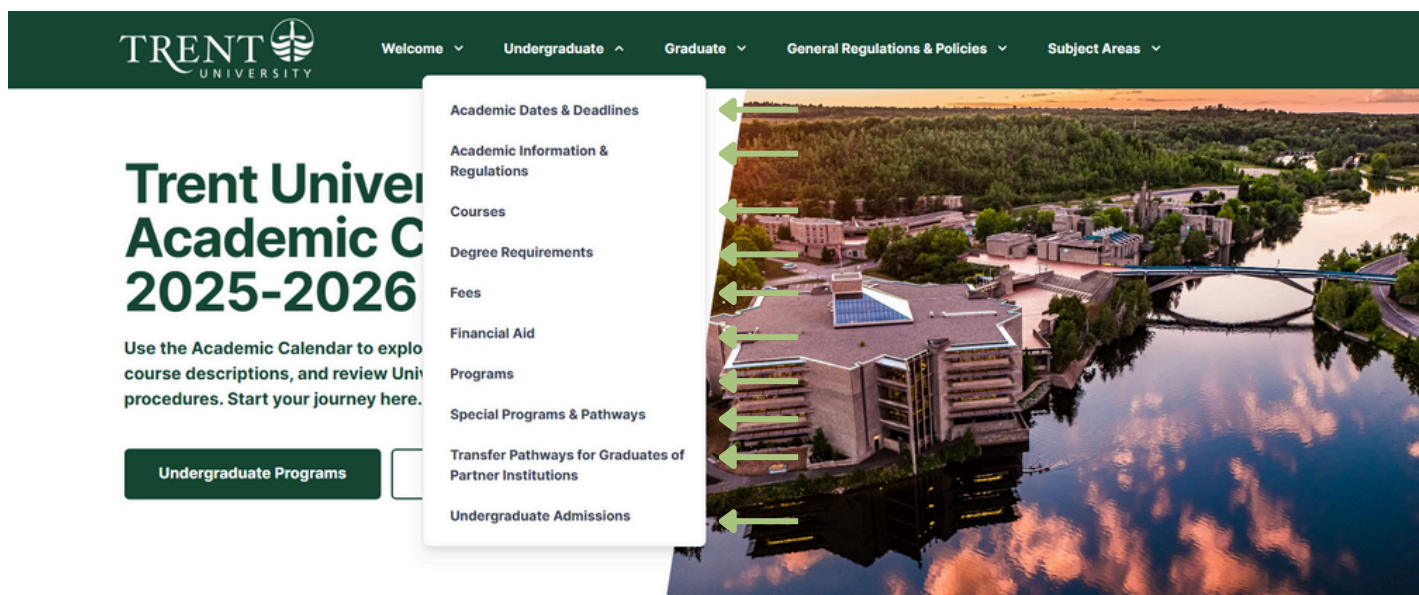


Figure 3: Undergraduate Tab

Click on Graduate to find information applicable to Graduate Studies, including Graduate specific policies and regulations.

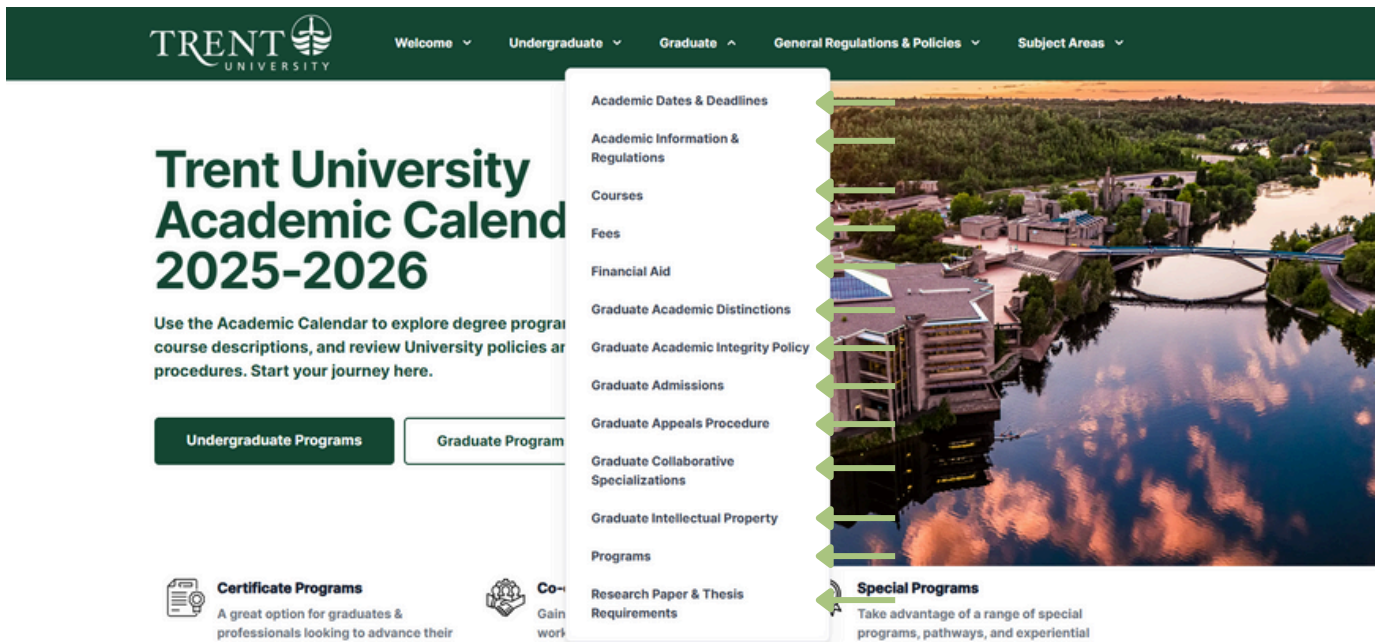


Figure 4: Graduate Tab

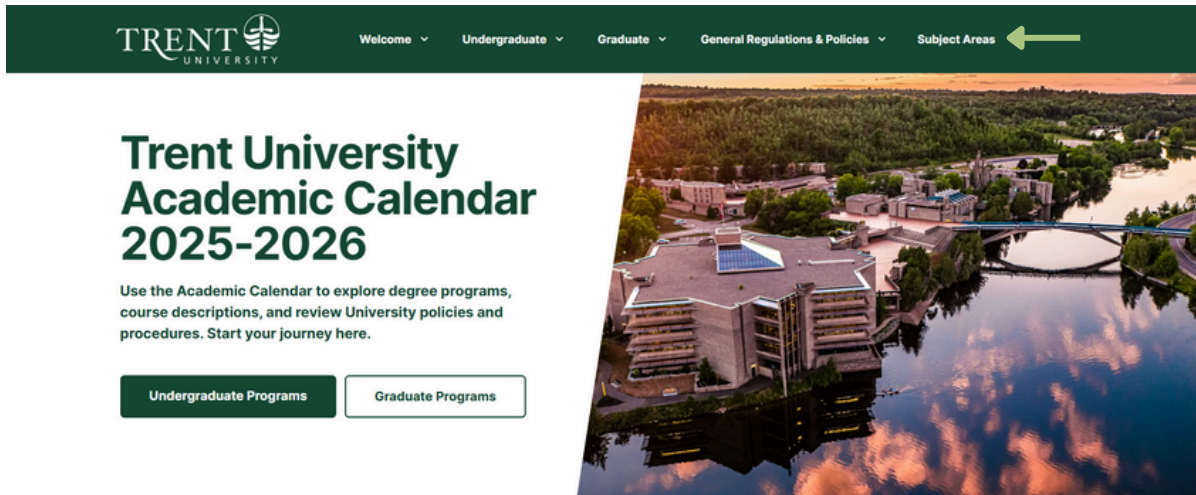


Figure 6: Subject Areas Tab

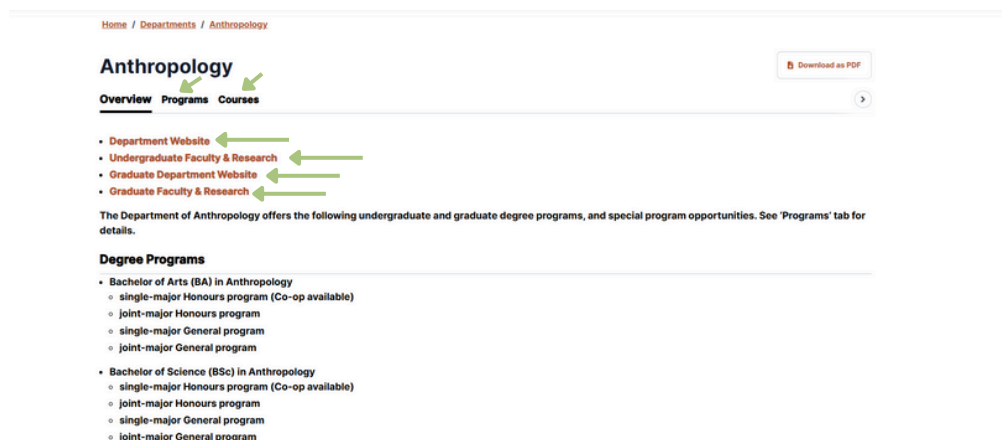


Figure 8: Subject Overview

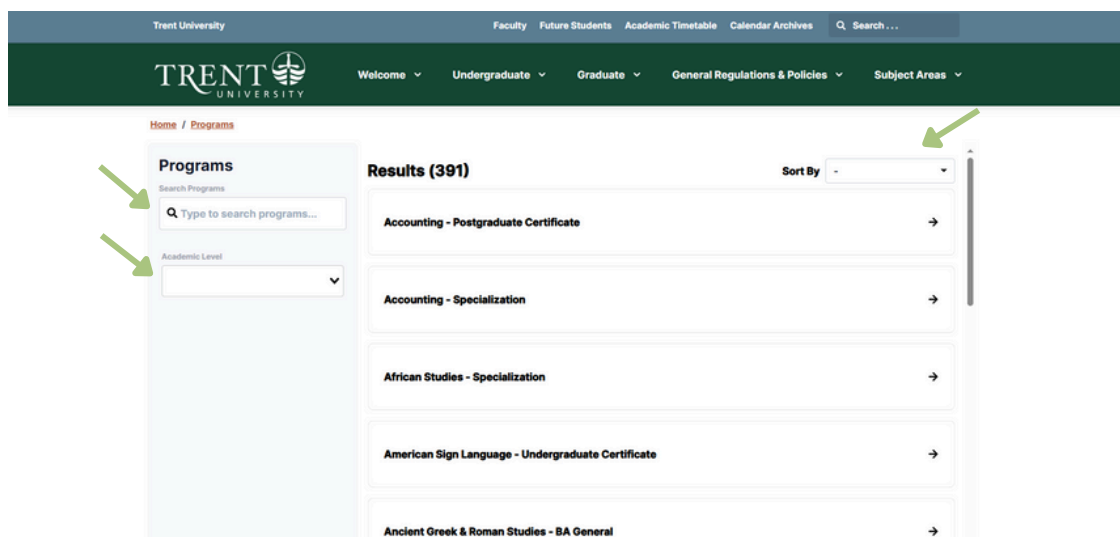


Figure 11: Program Search Menu

By clicking on a Graduate program, it will allow you to view the program overview. From there you can view the Degree Requirements and Program Regulations.

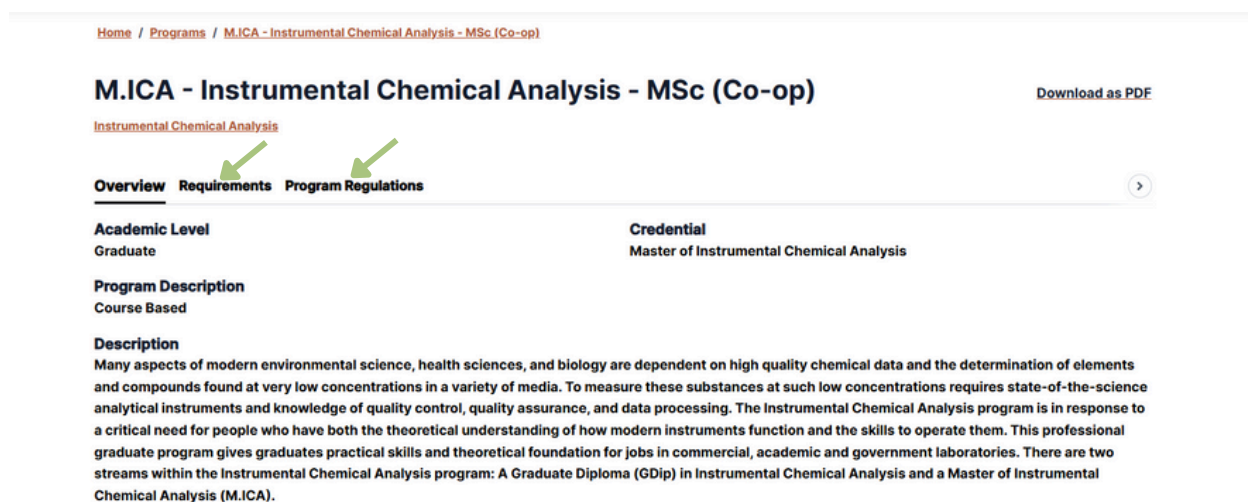


Figure 12: Graduate Program Overview

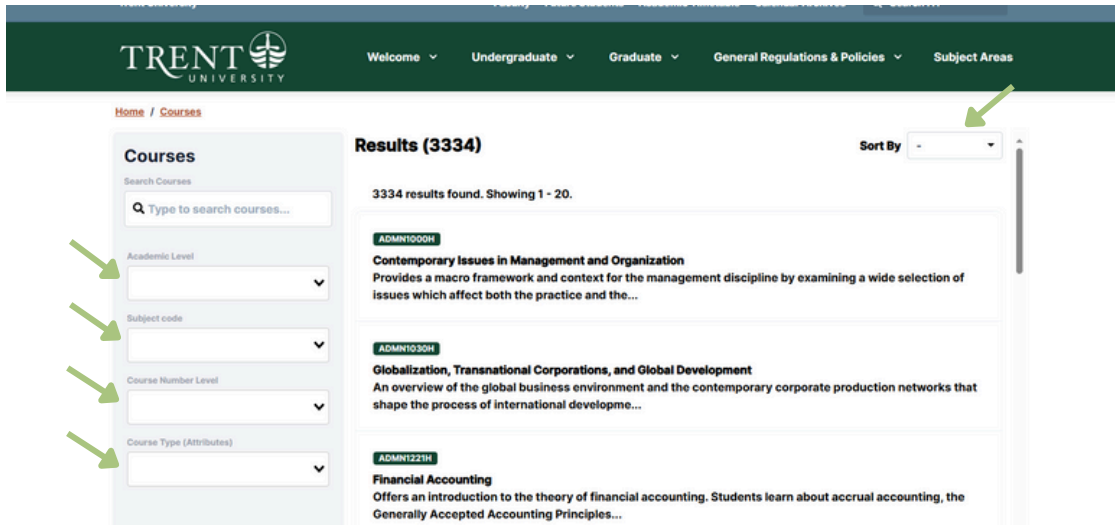


Figure 17: Course Search Menu

By clicking on a course, you can view a brief overview of the course. This overview includes the Subject Area(s), Academic Level, and Course Description. To view the course details, click 'View Course'

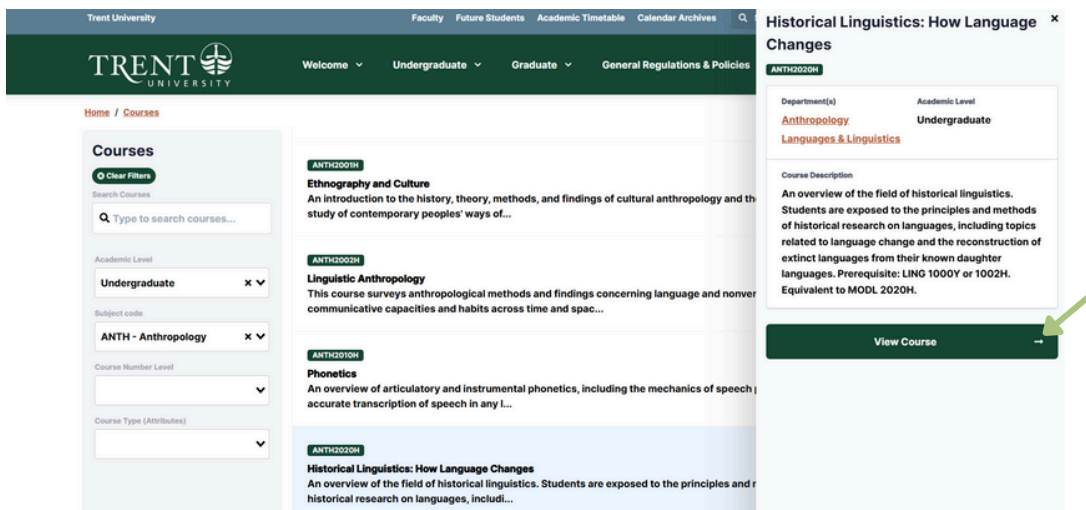


Figure 18: Course Overview

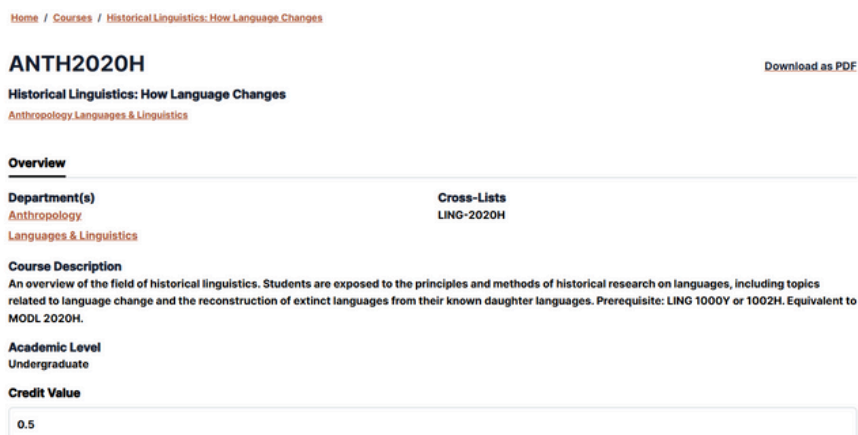


Figure 19: Course Description

After clicking on the search bar, it allows you to search the Academic Calendar. The search filters include Resources, Programs, Subject Areas, and Courses.

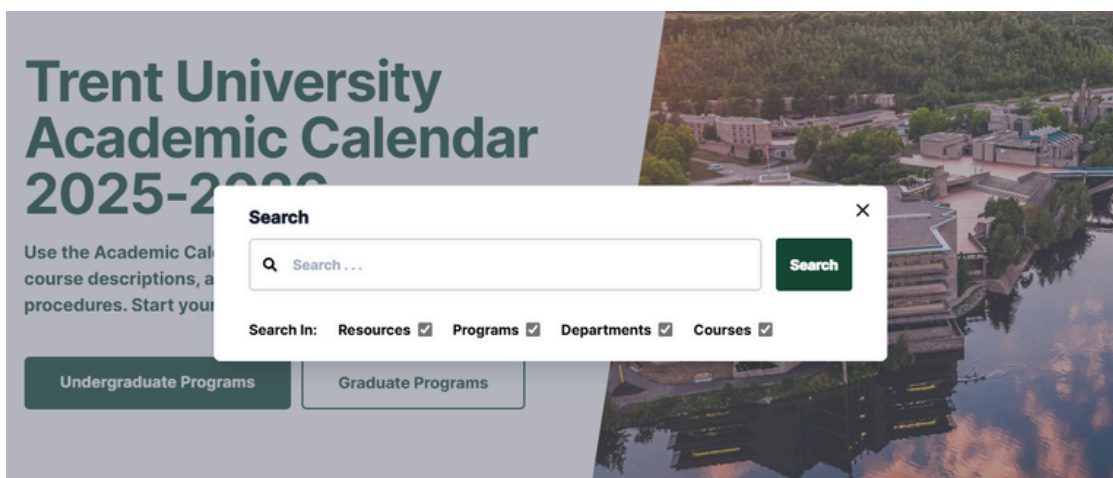


Figure 20: Search Bar

Once the Search Results are populated, you can update the search filters or change your search.

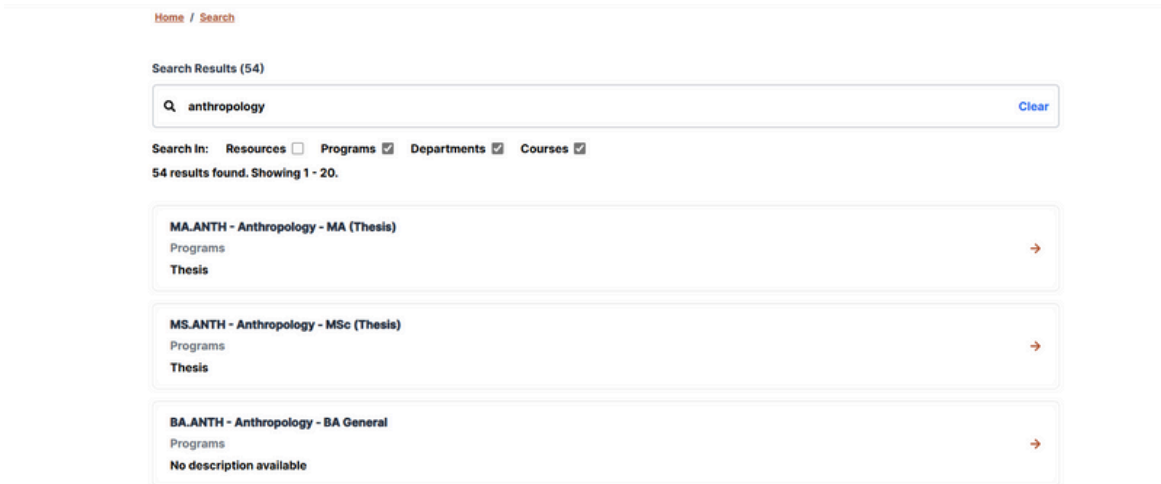


Figure 21: Search Results

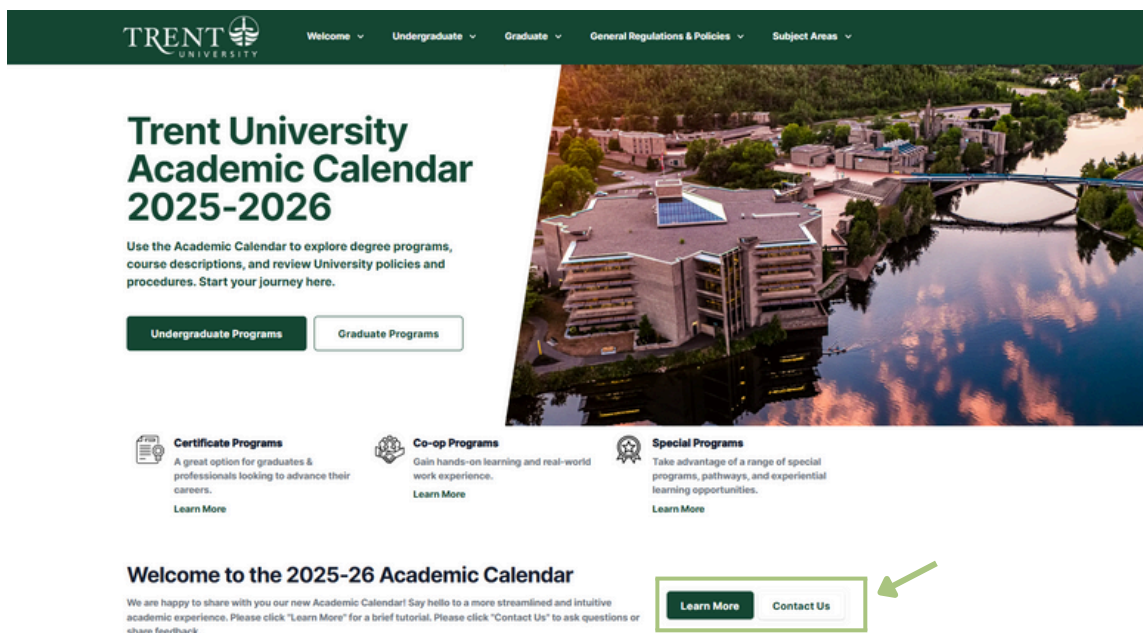


Figure 22: Contact Us
